# From the Senior Pastor Treasures of Darkness



Most of us avoid darkness, or we at least prefer light over darkness. Darkness can be scary. Total darkness—the absence of all light—can be downright unsettling. Without the ability to identify by sight our surroundings, we easily succumb to fear, afraid of threats, both real and imagined.

Our faith leads us to remember, and take comfort in, the promise of God to be with us especially in

the darkest times of our lives. The hymn "In Deepest Night" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, No. 699) helps us remember that promise:

In deepest night, in darkest days, when harps are hung, no songs we raise, when silence must suffice as praise, yet sounding in us quietly there is the song of God.

When friend was lost, when love deceived, dear Jesus wept, God was bereaved; so with us in our grief God grieves, and round about us mournfully there are the tears of God.

When through the waters winds our path, around us pain, around us death: deep calls to deep, a saving breath, and found beside us faithfully there is the love of God.

"The song of God," "the tears of God," "the love of God"—these are treasures that God provides us especially in our darkest times, gifts to which we cling as we feel our way through the night, eager for the dawn to come, gifts that even allow us to linger in the dark in ways that teach us lessons we otherwise would never learn.

We will gather for worship at OSL under this theme this Advent on Wednesday evenings at 6:40. The Celebrate Center will become darkened throughout worship. Even so, we will be invited to experience that darkness as a safe place filled with a treasure all its own, the treasure of being in community with fellow followers of Jesus and the treasure of the promised presence of the Holy Spirit.

I hope you join us for what promises to be a very special Advent journey here at OSL. And while you're at it, why not make plans now to celebrate the joy of Christmas here at Our Savior's as well?



One of the things that stuck with me from Stephen Ministry training was the difference between loads and burdens. Our loads are the

normal responsibilities we carry out: we brush our teeth, do some work, maintain relationships, and generally

navigate life. Loads vary at each stage of life; we don't expect kids to carry the same loads as adults; we don't expect the elderly to shoulder as much as younger folk. Of course, we all experience overload, either by our own overzealous yes-saying or out of true necessity. But overall, our loads are fair, and they balance out.

Burdens are different. Burdens are problems with no "easy" button: loss of loved one, health problems, fractured relationships, financial crises, gnawing guilt or anxiety. While it's fair to expect people to carry their loads, burdens should

not be carried alone. Unfortunately, we try to do just that, especially during the holidays when "merry" seems to reign. We go at it alone, hid-

ing burdens, toughing it out. This gives burdens even more power to rob us of health, peace, or even faith

The author Karen Salmansohn writes, "Sometimes you just need to talk about something—not to get sympathy or help, but just to kill its power by allowing the truth of things to hit the air."

Many people deal with feelings of loneliness each day, in our society, at church, even in our own homes. How we provide support and care for these people comes in a variety of ways, one of which is the **Buddy Bench Ministry.** 

The idea began one day when a grade school student on a playground

noticed some of the kids didn't have anyone to play with. This student had compassion for them, and decided that she wanted to be a friend to those who looked lonely. She would sit on a bench at recess and wait for those who were alone to sit with her, then she would offer to go play with them, or to just sit and talk and be a friend to them for a while. Soon there were news stories about this compassionate caregiver of the playground, and the concept of the Buddy Bench began. Since then, the idea has taken off, with schools, hospitals, and churches putting Buddy Benches in the buildings and on their

grounds. From this one little act of compassion and kindness, a whole movement began.



The Caring Ministries Team decided that we too wanted to provide a Buddy Bench for our congregation, and through the generous support of the grandchildren of Warren Iensen, this dream has become a reality. Given in memory of Warren, who was a buddy to everyone

he met, the OSL Buddy Bench now sits in front of the Church Office windows, just off The Gathering Place. If you are in need of a buddy,

## **An Artist's Life Revealed**

"Robert J. Aldern: An Artist's Life Revealed" is on exhibit at Piper, 1825 S. Minnesota Ave., through Dec. 29. The exhibit features rare, never-before-exhibited liturgical designs, landscape drawings and oil paintings, and watercolor and graphite figure studies by Robert Aldern, whose liturgical artworks enhance each of the three worship spaces at OSL. Additional works are also included, many previously only available as reproductions. A portion of the proceeds will go to the Robert Aldern Art Scholarship at Augustana University. For more information, contact Piper, 339-0346.

Bob Aldern's work is well-known to the OSL community: His first major piece of liturgical art was the Ascension Mural on the Chancel wall of the Sanctuary. The mural, oil on brick, was designed and painted by Aldern, assisted by R. P. Child; the lettering is by Herm Griller. The mural wall rises 45 feet from floor to the ceiling. The Christ figure is 22 feet high; the gold-leaf halo is 81 inches in diameter. The mural depicts Jesus' physical ascension into heaven. The hair of the two "spiritual beings" to Jesus' right and left is swept by the wind of the Holy Spirit into the Christ figure.


Aldern's work also enhances the worship experience in the chapel. The Chapel Mural, imagined as a teaching tool for Sunday School students as well as everyone who worships here, depicts the seasons of the church year: Annunciation, Nativity, Epiphany, Lent,



Crucifixion, Resurrec-


tion, Ascension, Trinity, Visitation, Transfiguration, and Pentecost. It was completed in 1974.

The artist's last major commission was the triptych "God of Grace and God of Glory," which previously was displayed in the south entrance but which now graces the Celebrate Center. Designed and executed by Aldern and Noreen Aldern Groethe, the triptych—stain on red oak flooring—was commissioned for the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Our Savior's and given in memory of Brooke Anderson Joniak by her parents, Lynn and Diane



Bob Aldern died in 2011, leaving a legacy of beautiful works that live on to glorify God.

This month's feature, on December 8, will be The Last Straw.







## **New for Middle**and High-School Youth

Ahimsa by Supriya Kelkar. In 1942, when Mahatma Gandhi asks



the people of India to give one family member to the freedom movement, ten-year-old Anjali is devastated to think of her father risking his life for the freedom struggle.

It turns out he isn't the one joining: Anjali's mother is. With this change comes many more adjustments designed to improve their country and use "ahimsa"—non-violent resistance—to stand up to the British government.

First the family must trade in their fine foreign-made clothes for homespun cotton, so Anjali has to give up her prettiest belongings. Then her mother decides to reach out to the Dalit community, the "untouchables" of Indian society. Anjali is forced to get over her past prejudices as her family becomes increasingly involved in the movement.

When Anjali's mother is jailed, Anjali must step out of her comfort zone to take over her mother's work, ensuring that her little part of the independence movement is completed.

Inspired by her great-grandmother's experience working with Gandhi, New Visions Award winner Supriya Kelkar shines a light on the Indian freedom movement in this poignant début.
