# In Church and Community

### From the Senior Pastor It's Time to Vote



Nearly a year ago, we voted to pilot a revised governance structure at Our Savior's that both empowers and engages living out the mission we share at OSL to proclaim Christ and nurture faith that connects with every-

day life. We anticipated giving the new structure at least a year to prove itself an effective improvement over our former structure. The time has come for us to evaluate whether that trial period was sufficient to give us the information we need to vote to ratify the Interim Bylaws, or if we need additional time.

As a way of preparing for that conversation, I offer this month a very brief summary of the governance structure we've been trying out for the last year or so.

#### **Governing Board Replaces Congregation**

**Council.** The Governing Board is comprised of the president, vice president, immediate past president, secretary, treasurer, one at-large member, and the senior pastor. Members are elected by the congregation at the annual meeting, except the immediate past president and the senior pastor, who serve by virtue of their respective positions. Previously, the congregation council included four officers, four at-large members, and 12 board representatives, all elected by the congregation. The pastors and the president of the Women of the ELCA attended council meetings as non-voting members.

**Standing Committees.** Three standing committees appointed by the Governing Board assist the board.

- **Finance.** Chaired by the treasurer and comprised of three to five members including the senior pastor, the Finance Committee prepares an annual ministry plan (budget), reviews and monitors monthly financials, provides for annual reviews or audits, develops and oversees debt and risk management strategies, and provides leadership and oversight in other aspects related to the financial management of the congregation.
- Policy and Leadership Development. Comprised of three to five members including a member of the Governing Board and the senior pastor, this committee identifies and trains future leaders, reviews and recommends changes to existing policies and governing documents, and recommends new policies related to governance.
- **Stewardship Development.** Comprised of five to seven members including a member of the Governing Board and the

senior pastor, this committee is responsible for developing a culture of stewardship and relationship development that creates an ongoing spirit of giving and generosity, coordinates and conducts the annual stewardship appeal, provides ongoing *continued*

stewardship education to the congregation, and centralizes all church appeals, financial and in-kind, for awareness and coordination.

**Core Ministry Teams Replace Boards.** Five Core Ministry Teams led by staff/pastors provide key leadership to the ministry of the church.

- **Worship.** The Worship Core Ministry Team provides leadership and vision to the worship ministry of the congregation.
- Faith Formation. The Faith Formation Core Ministry Team provides leadership and vision to the faith formation ministry of the congregation. The scope of focus for this core ministry team is members and friends of Our Savior's from the time they are born through high-school graduation.
- **Discipleship.** The Discipleship Core Ministry Team provides leadership and vision to the adult faith formation ministry of the congregation, focusing on members and friends of Our Savior's age 19 and older. Areas of ministry developed and managed by this core ministry team may include education, small group ministry, fellowship, spiritual gifts discernment, new member integration, and others.

- **Spiritual Care.** The Spiritual Care Core Ministry Team provides leadership and vision to the spiritual care ministry of the congregation. Areas of ministry developed and managed by this core ministry team may include spiritual growth, caring ministry, senior ministry, and others.
- Love in Action. The Love in Action Core Ministry Team provides leadership and vision to the outreach ministries of the congregation. Areas of ministry developed and managed by this core ministry team may include marketing, hospitality, social ministry, Christian service, missions, evangelism, and others.

A fuller description of this pilot governance structure is contained in the Interim Bylaws, available in the church office and at oslchurch. com/our-saviors-interim-bylaws/. I encourage you to become familiar with this information in anticipation of the annual meeting scheduled for January 26, when we will consider a resolution to ratify the interim bylaws.

As always, thank you for the partnership we share in mission and ministry.

# Congregational Life Connecting Faith and Life


We need to talk about racism; our faith compels us to do so. The truth of it, though, is that it is one of the most difficult conversations we can engage. Emotions can often derail our best efforts and we end up feeling stuck and frustrated, if not like a failure as a follower of Jesus.

Happy New Year! Have you made a New Year's resolution? With good intentions, a clean slate,





With November's worship and preaching series, *Belong*, came a new opportunity for moms of kids through grade 12.

*Belong* invited us to think about who we are and about how we feel about who we are. One of the coolest things about my work is not only getting to help influence the faith of children and empower parents in their homes, but also to hear your stories and your concerns and your heartaches, and the things that you celebrate. And that is really holy ground for me, to hear from you and share with you.

I think the common tie that binds is that, a lot of times, in quiet, I hear, "I'm not enough." We all want to be a better mom. We want to have a cleaner home. We want to Uber our kids to more places. We wish we could be a better employee, a more patient wife, you name it. And so we



feel not enough. Yet we have this God who says, "Though you feel imperfect, I am perfect, and you are perfectly loved." So the common tie that binds all of us is that we

belong together. That God loves us. That we can safely create a space to talk about this and be real with one another, and find solidarity in our feelings and our experiences.

Thus was born OverBOOKed Moms, an online book club in a private Facebook group, which eliminated the struggle to find the perfect time to meet—since we know that, with our varying schedules, such a time does not exist. This virtual living-room allowed all of us to read in our homes and touch base, through online reflection, whenever it worked.

Our first selection was *Present over Perfect* by Shauna Niequist. The response was immediate. Forty-five moms of kids through grade five are part of this thriving space, and in addition to shared reflection, we've laughed together over mama's Monday mood gifs, prayed over each other, and offered input on helps for home repairs. Community has helped individuals in the congregation become friends and deepen relationships.



#### Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the



*Whitest Denomination in the U.S.* by Lenny Duncan. Lenny Duncan is the unlikeliest of pastors. Formerly incarcerated, he is now a black preacher in the whitest denomination in the United States: the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

Shifting demographics and shrinking congregations make all the headlines, but Duncan sees something else at work—drawing a direct line

between the church's lack of diversity and the church's lack of vitality. He discusses that the problems the ELCA faces are theological, not sociological, and so are the answers.

Part manifesto, part confession, and all love letter, *Dear Church* offers a bold new vision for the future of Duncan's denomination and the broader mainline Christian community of faith. *Dear Church* rejects the narrative of church decline and calls everyone—leaders and laity alike—to the front lines of the church's renewal through racial equality and justice.

It is time for the church to rise up, dust itself off, and take on forces of this world that act against God: whiteness, misogyny, nationalism, homophobia, and economic injustice. Duncan gives a blueprint for the way forward and urges us to follow in the revolutionary path of Jesus.



Lasting Love by Tony DiTerlizzi. When a family member or



other loved one becomes ill, one of the scariest aspects of their sickness is the way they may change, both physically and in spirit. The feeling of loss can come so early as the person becomes more difficult to recognize.

It's a hard thing for anyone to understand but especially for a child. This book offers a helpful visualization of a sick person's essence as a friendly creature who remains strong and warm, even as the illness progresses. The sick person

is always around and never tries to cheer up the child, but only serves to keep them company.

Caroline Wright and Willow Heath clearly understand that, like the sick person, a book cannot "fix" a painful situation or even make it a little better. Instead, the authors simply reflect the pain of loss back to the reader and help them understand that they are not alone.
