I'm writing this shortly after I preached a sermon on prayer in which I shared with the worshiping assembly a note that had been passed along to me on the back of the debtretirement survey we had distributed in July to gauge the congregation's comfort level with our current level of indebtedness and our continued fundraising to meet our goal of paying off our mortgage by the time we turn 75, in 2021. I

shared the note with the intention of lifting up the reality that there are some in our midst who feel disconnected from the OSL community, and to give the gathered assembly a meaningful response to this reality—praying for those who feel disenchanted with OSL and for all of us as we live out our calling to be the Body of Christ.

It's very easy when things seem to be going well to look past those in our midst who may feel like their experience at church doesn't meet their expectations. There is something alluring about riding the wave of excitement and satisfaction that comes with success, especially when it follows a period of strategic planning and goal-setting and the hard work that results in trying to accomplish those goals. We all like to be part of a winning team. We all enjoy celebrating a victory. But if we do so without being mindful of those who feel like they missed the bus, who feel like their church has let them down, we've ignored a critical piece of what it means to be "community."

At the heart of community in the church is our theology of the Table. At Holy Communion, Christ himself welcomes everyone to receive the gifts he offers: his own body and blood, and with them the forgiveness of our sin. There is no prerequisite to coming to the table; Jesus simply says, "Come, and I will give you what you need to believe and live." At the table, regardless of who we are or what we do, each of us is regarded the same—as a sinner in need of forgiveness

and as one whom God loves and adores. As a result of the grace we receive at the table, we are released of everything that would cause us to maintain divisions between us and others, and are empowered to be agents of God's grace in the world.

As we aspire to live out our core value of Community at OSL, I implore you all to orient your actions around this central theology, especially as you respond to critiques like the one given to me anonymously toward the end of July. While it's true that our mission must absolutely guide all that we do as a church, and it's also true that we will never be all things for all people, it is also just as true that each of us is called to

tend to the needs of our neighbors, even those with whom we may disagree. In the spirit of community, lend a listening ear when someone needs to share their pain; let compassion, not anger, shape your response; see each other as the apples of God's eye; serve each other and the world God made with graciousness and joy; and witness to the wide welcome God extends to all through Jesus. Together let us strive to deepen our experience of God's love through the power of authentic and accountable relationships with one another.

As we step into a new program year at OSL, "How are we going to be when we gather together?" Will you join me in renewing our commitment to endeavor in every way to be the kind of community God has made us to be, where all are welcome and all encounter the amazing grace of God in life together?





Addiction Awareness Sunday, September 22 With opioid deaths on the rise, and the overwhelming problem of meth

With opioid deaths on the rise, and the overwhelming problem of methaddiction in our communities, getting help is the first line of defense. Oftentimes, though, families struggle to find treatment for a loved one struggling with addiction, especially the right kind of treatment.

OSL's Addiction Awareness Sunday will be on September 22, at 10:00 A.M., in the Celebrate Center. The discussion will focus on issues surrounding addiction and how they affect the lives of people around us every day.

As part of that morning's conversation, OSL member Melissa Flynn



(pictured at left) will share her family's struggle with addiction. A lifetime Sioux Falls resident, Melissa has three children, including her stepson, Nicholas, who died from an opioid overdose in May 2018 after years of battling addiction.

"I feel like I have an obligation to share what I have been through," says Melissa. "We're losing so many people to addiction, and I just feel

like this has to stop. We need to help educate families, we need to save lives, we need to end the stigma and allow people to talk about addiction and seek help—and honestly, helping is the only thing that makes me feel better."

Nicholas' years-long battle with addiction was tumultuous, isolating and painful for the entire family. Melissa describes their fight with addiction as a giant octopus with an unrelenting clutch. "We would fight to get one tentacle off of us, and then another tentacle would grab us. It was a constant battle with little to no relief," she says. "The octopus squeezed the air out of our lungs, the joy out of our lives and the money out of our pocket books, but we kept fighting, we kept hoping, we kept loving."

For loved ones who still feel they are in this position, Melissa's advice includes education, hope and compassion. "Talk about it, seek help for yourself first and educate yourself," Melissa says. "I like to say, 'Lead with love.' Understand that your loved one is suffering and needs help in the right way. I also want people to know help is possible—it's okay to hope. Because for so many years, we felt hopeless."

Bearing Fruit by Joan Bacon

You can feel it in the air—summer has fallen behind us, and autumn, the time of bearing fruit for



the harvest, is here. For Christians, bearing fruit extends beyond autumn and across our whole lives. Jesus has called us to bear fruit: "No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear

fruit unless you remain in me." John 15:4

But how can this fruit bearing be accomplished when one is in the midst of a serious struggle, major loss, or troubling challenge? Henri Nouwen wrote about being fruitful during hard times in *You Are the Beloved*. He claimed that our fruitfulness often comes out of those very times when we have been raked open like hard ground by something that leaves us vulnerable and powerless: "And the mystery is that our illness and weakness and our many ways of dying are often the ways... that will allow us to be more fruitful if lived faithfully. Precisely where we are weakest and often most broken and needy, precisely there can be the ground of our fruitfulness." Nouwen reminded us that something new can be raised during hard times—even from something as hard as death.

If autumn finds you seeking how to live faithfully when you feel raked open, vulnerable, or power-less, Stephen Ministers are available to walk beside you. Bishop Hagmaier is married to Pr. Dirk Hagmaier, and they have two children, Paul, 20, and Emma, 4, and one foster son, Lymann, 21. The Hagmaiers have been serving at Trinity Lutheran Church in Madison, where Pr. Dirk continues to serve.

Bishop Hagmaier's first experience of South Dakota was in 1987, as a Rotary exchange student, living in Sioux Falls and attending Brandon Valley High School and Brandon Lutheran Church. She continued her education in Germany at Ruprecht-Karls-Universität Heidelberg, where she graduated with her Master of Divinity degree in 1999. Upon the family's immigration to the United States in September 1999, the couple affiliated with Luther Seminary in St. Paul, and were ordained in 2001 while serving the Waubay Lutheran Parish at NeSoDak Bible Camp.




calls they may have to serve the community.



"Whoo Loves Books" **Fall Reading Program**




The OSL Library's fall reading program, "Whoo Loves Books," will run from September 8 through November 24, for children, youth, and adults.


When Joyce Smith's 14-year-old son John fell through an icy Missouri lake one winter morning, she and her family had seemingly lost everything. At the hospital, John lay lifeless for more than 60 minutes, but Joyce was not ready to give up on her son. She mustered all her faith and strength into one force and cried out to God in a loud voice to save him. Miraculously, her son's heart immediately started beating again.

Breakthrough is about a profound truth: prayer really does work. God uses it to remind us that God is always with us, and when we combine it with unshakable faith, nothing is impossible.


Clark, the so-called Marsh Girl.

each month in the OSL Library to discuss that month's book. The September 26 selection will be *Americanah* by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie.





to remain in the harbor. It's up to Natalie to convince the town to locate Bangor's pod and return him safely home, even if it means saying goodbye to her new friend.


Full of humor and heart, *A Dog's Porpoise* asks readers to consider what it means to be a good friend, especially during tough times.
