These experiences make meaningful memories, but that is not all. After entertaining nursing home residents by playing the piano and singing songs in Minneapolis last summer, two rising high-schoolers decided to join the Celebrate Band when they got home. Meaningful care facility experiences for many of the students have led to a developing long-term relationship between the Middle and High School Youth Groups and Luther Manor.

At the ELCA Youth Gathering in Houston, we had the opportunity to delve into relevant and challenging topics at the Mass Gathering each night. These talks continued into the wee hours and made for a safe place for hard questions and discoveries about God and the complex and diverse world we live in. Many of the students who attended this triennial event are now involved in leadership through Peer Ministry and the Youth Leadership Team. Their experiences and perspectives have allowed us to go deeper in our conversations since we've been back at home.

In 2019, the high-schoolers are looking forward to pushing themselves to their physical and mental limits by hiking the stunning Sangre de Cristo Mountains in Colorado. They will serve one another through encouraging words, helping hands to overcome physical obstacles, and daily tasks at the campsite. They will meet God in the beauty of creation and in the love of those around them.

Middle- and high-schoolers will go to Minneapolis for a new type of community service trip this year. They also will serve one another through daily tasks like cooking and cleaning up after one another, and they will undoubtedly step out of their comfort zones when they are called on to serve adults and children at their service sites each day. Their daily itineraries will also include worship and fun excursions around the area.

These students work hard to prepare for these trips, give up a week of their summer break, and actively participate in fundraising, but these trips would not be possible without your prayerful and financial support as well. As we look forward to our trips to Duluth, Minnesota, and Rainbow Trail in Hillside, Colorado, John and I and the 45 youths and adults who will be attending the summer trips will need your help to bring the cost of these trips within reach for everyone.

Your first opportunity to help with this effort is the upcoming Silent Auction. There are two ways you can help make this event a success. First, you will be invited to check out the items and make bids during regularly scheduled



Unexpected Gifts in Unexpected Situations By Joan Bacon

Sometimes I just have to shake my head and laugh at myself!

Like last week
when I searched
for a sock that went
missing shortly
after I pulled it



(along with its partner) from the sock drawer, only to find that very sock on my right foot! Or like when January's Stephen Ministry article, in which I anticipated dreary "snow on snow," came out just in time to greet a sunny January thaw! These incidents demonstrate that I am not well-gifted for 1) playing any game requiring short-term memory or 2) doing any job that requires predicting the future.

Mental Health First Aid at OSL February 28

Mental Health First Aid is the initial help given to someone who may be developing a mental illness or experiencing a mental health crisis. The aid provided is not a substitute for professional help, but may help in stabilizing the person until appropriate professional or other assistance is engaged.

This eight-hour course will teach people how to give first aid to individuals experiencing a mental health crisis situation and/or who are in the early stages of a mental health disorder. Participants will learn the signs and symptoms of the most common mental health problems,

But the Bible says that despite our human shortcomings (some laughable, some painfully consequential), we each have God-given gifts to be used to benefit others and glorify God. Be astonished by signs of God's grace and presence—signs that often come through unexpected people, with unexpected gifts, during unexpected situations. OSLC Foundation Our Lives are Like the Mississippi River

I'm not actually going to tell that story in this article—it's too long and perhaps too personal. But I wanted to get your attention: this month's topic is charitable gift annuities, a boring title but an exciting subject!

The following is based on an actual occurrence: Many years ago, my parents exchanged shares of a stock they owned for a charitable gift annuity contract. They received many items of note from this action:

- The rate of the annuity was based on their ages as a joint life annuity.
- They received a current charitable deduction.
- They began to receive a monthly deposit to their checking account for the rest of their lives. A portion of the income was taxable as ordinary income. A portion of the income was taxable as capital gain income. A portion of that monthly income was tax-free.
- They received a tax statement at the end of the year to reflect this income.

For several years, month-in and month-out, the annuity payment was deposited in their checking account. After Mom passed, the annuity payments kept coming until the day Dad died. The remainder (residual) of the annuity stayed with the charity and added to the charity's growing endowment fund. Each year the fund pays out a scholarship for a nursing student in honor of my Mom, a nurse.

You too can enjoy the benefits of a charitable gift annuity! The annuity contract is with the ELCA Foundation, and the payments are backed by the foundation's assets, with Our Savior's Lutheran Church Foundation as the remainder beneficiary.



selection for the Winter One Church One Read title.



"Two Children for Sale." The sign is a last resort. It sits on a farmhouse porch in 1931, but could be found anywhere in an era of breadlines, bank runs, and broken dreams. Any mother facing impossible choices could have written it.

For struggling reporter Ellis Reed, the gut-wrenching scene evokes memories of his family's dark past. He snaps a photograph


of the children, not meant for publication, but when it leads to his big break, the consequences are more devastating than he ever imagined.

At the paper, Lillian Palmer is haunted by her role in all that happened. She is far too familiar with the heartbreak of children deemed unwanted. As the bonds of motherhood are tested, she and Ellis must decide how much they are willing to risk to mend a fractured family.

Inspired by an actual newspaper photograph that stunned the nation, Sold on a Monday is a powerful novel of love, redemption, and the unexpected paths that bring us home.


Despite being happy in his new family, Saroo always wondered about his origins. When he

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



about this subterranean spiritual world. Meanwhile, Alfonso's family and friends struggle with their grief and seek justice for Alfonso in the streets. As they confront their new realities, both Alfonso and those he loves realize the work that lies ahead in the fight for justice.

In the first graphic novel for young readers to focus on police brutality and the Black Lives Matter movement, as in *Hamlet*, the dead shall speak—and the living yield even more surprises.
