

as the Holy Spirit led them to a moment of insight, been doubting their faith in God altogether, laughing about great coincidences, angry about unfair circumstances, planning an exciting journey, stuck and unsure how to get unstuck, wishes they could be here with you at OSL, wishes they could get a fresh start somewhere else in the world where no one knows them.

Many things separate us. One thing unites us. The promise we have from God that we are held in a loving relationship that comes each day through the Holy Spirit and the new life in Jesus. In this season of Epiphany, we are reminded that Christ's light shines in all of these places. We are called not only to receive that light but to carry it into the world. We shine when we reflect God's love through compassion, patience, honesty, courage, and hope. We shine when we notice one another, pray for one another, and live as people shaped by the light of Christ for the sake of our neighbors.

Augustana University Receives \$5 Million Grant

Ann Rosendale. “Augustana University will equip a new generation of storytellers who can share God’s faithfulness with clarity, courage and hope wherever their callings lead them.” Augustana expects to officially launch “Sacred Discoveries” in January 2026.

When writing about OSL's Caring Ministries, I often think of people who have a special title or designated role. For example, I may think of our Visitation Pastors, Stephen Ministers, bereavement counselors, or youth leaders. While these people are indeed caregivers, I believe all of us are caregivers, with or without a title.

It was my neighbor who showed up in my driveway with her snowblower, uninvited, to clear my driveway because my snowblower had failed to work one day. She came back the next day to do it again after the snowplows went by. What wonderful caregiving! And what a blessing for both of us. And what about someone who speaks up and says, "Are you looking for these?" And, oh what a smile can do, for both the giver and the receiver.


I truly believe all of us are in need of care. The care we need is offered to us many times each day, if we pay attention to our needs, as well as the needs of others. As the noted theologian Henri Nouwen writes, "We want to help. We want to do something for people in need. We want to offer consolation to those who are in grief and alleviate suffering to those who are in pain. There is obviously nothing wrong with that desire. It is a noble and grace-filled desire. But unless we realize that God's blessing is coming to us from those we want to serve, our help will be short-lived, and eventually we may feel burned out (p.65)."

So, what is this blessing? Nouwen would say "It is a glimpse of the face of God. Seeing God is what heaven is all about! We can see God in the face of Jesus, and we can see Jesus in the face of those who need our care. We so much need a blessing. Those in need of our care are waiting to bless us (p.66)."

In embracing this view, we come to understand that caring for others is not solely about giving; it is also about receiving. Each act of compassion, no matter how small, opens our eyes to the divine presence in our midst. When we serve others with genuine love, we are blessed with a glimpse of God's face. These encounters will go on to renew our spirit and deepen our faith. As we look for opportunities to care, let us remember that in doing so, we are participating in God's grace, becoming both the caregivers and the cared for, witnesses to His love in the world.





The cash-basis Statement of Activity is a snapshot of the membership's financial support of the General Fund (daily ministry) of Our Savior's Lutheran Church through November. We did have a November deficit as our general fund offerings for November came in at \$102,523.45 and our total income was \$115,350.30.

Our expenses for November ended at \$130,545.40. However, our fiscal year-to-date net operating income is still positive through November!

For due diligence, I do want to note that this financial snapshot does not consider depreciation expenses for OSLC. Our monthly depreciation expense is approximately \$32,000. If you ever want to know more about our finances, feel

Numbers aside, we are blessed to be a part of something so much greater than ourselves. Jesus is alive and well here at OSL and within us all. It is easy to see that each time we enter through the doors and share kindness, love, and our faith with one another.

Hold something to signal your hands are occupied.
Communicate your needs gently.
Fold Your Hands to show you aren't open to touch.
Offer an alternative to handshaking first.

Friendship Club

We are happy to welcome back Phyllis Arends as the speaker for Friendship Club on January 6th. Phyllis is a longtime advocate for people whose lives are touched by mental illness. Her passion for helping those living with serious mental illness diagnoses began while she was a nurse at 5th Street Connection. She then made it her mission to educate the public that these are medical illnesses like any other medical illness. They just happen to affect the most important organ in our body – the brain. She brings a message of understanding and hope to those who are on this journey to mental wellness.

Phyllis and others joined together to start a nonprofit organization, Empire Mental Health Support, dedicated to providing community outreach and education to help dispel myths and misperceptions about mental illnesses. Empire Mental Health Network also offers peer led support groups both in-person and hybrid for adults with the lived experience of mental illness and their loved ones. Empire Mental Health Support is also the local advocacy group working to improve the system of care for those who live with the most serious diagnoses. Treatment works, but only if it is accessible, affordable and effective.

Even though winter is just beginning, we're already looking ahead to summer adventures at Bible Camp! Camp has long been a meaningful part of life at Our Savior's Lutheran Church, giving kids and youth space to learn about faith, build friendships, and experience God's love through creation, community, and fun. Registration & Payment

Camp registration is coordinated through OSL. When registering online, families will use the Group Hold Code: **OSLSF26** to connect their camper to our church group. Parents will need to create or log into a camp account to complete registration. All camp payments will be made through OSL, and the church will submit one combined payment to the camp. Please make checks out to Our Savior's Lutheran Church with the camp on the memo line. To secure spots and qualify for Early Bird pricing, families should complete registration by **March 1**. (Please note: the group code holds a spot but does not guarantee Early Bird pricing after the camp deadline.)

Dear Our Savior's: The time has come to announce that my work as your Associate Interim Pastor will be concluding on Sunday, February 1. I have been amazed at what God has done and is doing in this special place. My nineteen months of work within this spirited congregation will be remembered as "icing on the cake" as I look back on forty years of ministry.

When I agreed to come and serve alongside Pastors Tim Lemme and Paul Svingen in early June of 2024, it was made clear that upon the installation of the new lead pastor (Welcome Pastor Michael!) that I would remain on staff for a set of weeks as ministry assignments and work in progress could be handed off. Interim calls—by their very design and definition--must come to an end. That is all happening now! I have sat with Pastors Tim and Michael, with office staff, Human Resources and Congregation Council leadership in making sure that we don't lose momentum as OSL transitions into its next season of discernment.

So let me be as clear as I can about my last weeks. In January, I am going to part-time status—working full-time in the first half of January and slowly less upon Pastor Michael's return from Egypt on the 19th of the month. My direct work with Community Library Coordinator Kristie Schreck and Faith Formation Director Madeline Trosvig is easily being transitioned to Pastor Michael. As well, my assignment as liaison to the Outreach and Evangelism Team (Faith and Ferment and Klein Ranch events) and my seat at the Stewardship Committee table will also be assumed by Pastor Michael.

The conclusion of Our Savior's need for interim pastors is to be celebrated. You have bravely faced forward into "what's next?" for the congregation. With Pastors Michael and Tim fully engaged, the door is now open to begin asking who will come and add their talents to the pastoral ministry team?...all to be discovered with the same prayerfulness that has already helped us begin to shine.


