MINISTRY GOALS & PRIORITIES – PR. MICHAEL STADTMUELLER

At this moment in our shared life, we are not trying to become the church we once were. Instead, we are asking deeper questions about who God is calling us to be now. Our task is one of faithful discernment, trusting that growth comes not from nostalgia, but from openness to the Spirit's movement in the present. Together, we will continue to listen, to experiment, and to grow toward the future God is unfolding among us. This season is one of transition, discernment, and hope. The work before us is not about recreating what once was but about listening carefully for what God is calling us to be today. That said there are some evident goals.

Pastoral Staffing and Support

As we say goodbye to Pastor Greg as our interim, we recognize that Pastor Tim and I will continue to need additional staff support as part of a strong pastoral team. Our hope is to bring clarity to the scope and focus of that position and to begin a formal discernment and hiring process following Lent.

Church Database Transition

We plan to formalize a transition to a new church database that is more user-friendly and better suited to our current and future needs. This change will support communication, engagement, and administrative clarity across ministries.

Senior High Ministry Planning

I am working closely with Madeline to develop a more formal Senior High Ministry plan. This includes a three-year vision for summer trips, incorporating participation in the National Youth Gathering as well as a "Beyond the Border" service and learning experience. The goal is to provide meaningful, faith-forming experiences that help students see themselves as part of the wider church and world.

Worship Planning and Creative Collaboration

We hope to establish worship themes for each season of the church year at least three months in advance. I will work collaboratively with Gene, the music staff, and fellow pastors in this planning process. By doing so, we aim to create space for congregational members to share their gifts in creative arts and to deepen the connection between worship, theology, and lived faith.

Augustana University Connections

I am reconnecting with relationships at Augustana University with the goal of strengthening the connection between our congregation and the campus community. This includes exploring ways we might support students, engage faculty and staff, and imagine shared ministry opportunities.

Community Service and Partnerships

In the area of service, I hope we can develop a team that regularly highlights local non-profits aligned with our mission. The vision is to focus on one organization each month, creating a clear pathway for members to engage through service opportunities while also encouraging financial support. This would help make our commitment to the wider community visible, tangible, and ongoing.

Together, they bring communion to our friends, and a reminder of how much they remain an important part of our church community even though they may not be able to be with us in person each week anymore. In addition to Pr. Bob and Maribeth’s visits, our team of Caring Friends visit our members each month for an informal time of fellowship and sharing Christ’s love. Well done, all of you!

Our Stephen Ministry team continues to serve a vital role of supporting our members who are going through difficult times, by sharing Christ’s love through listening ears and empathetic support. This past year four new volunteers were commissioned as Stephen Ministers, Vangie Jarman, Karen Kratochvil, Rhonda Mitchell, and Tom Schiefelbein. We are grateful for them, and to the gifts they bring to our Stephen Ministry program.

This past fall, we were excited to celebrate with our Faith Community Nurse, Lea DeLay, as she completed her FCN training and was officially installed as our Faith Community Nurse here at OSL. Lea continues to bless our congregation through her skills as an RN, and through her compassionate and caring heart. By caring for our members wholistically, she gives support to our pastoral staff as we offer support and love through body, mind, and soul care.

Look for Lea at our exercise classes, doing blood pressure checks on the weekends, doing hospital and hospice visits, and at our support group gatherings and bereavement support.

Thank you, Lea, for being a big part of our Spiritual Care Team!

One of the things I mentioned above was our Bereavement Ministry program. For those who have experienced the death of a loved one, this program offers additional support to families as they walk through this difficult time of life. Our Bereavement Coordinator, Sandy Fischer, provides resources to families, and connects them on a regular basis with our pastoral staff and Faith Community Nurse so that families feel supported and loved through the weeks and months after their loved one's death. We are so very grateful to Sandy for the support she offers to our Spiritual Care ministry team!

As you can see, there is much happening in our ministry area, and much to look forward too as we enter 2026. May God continue to bless the work we share, and may God bless us all, this 'family of God,' we call, Our Savior's Lutheran Church!

MANY THANKS – PR. GREG JOHNSON

Gratefully, I look back on a full year of ministry within and outside the walls of Our Saviors. It was a year where we began to speak more often of “growth” and “renewal” and “change” within our congregation.

In the midst of that change, my role needed to expand halfway through 2025. With Pastor Karen concluding her daily work in the office in May of 2025, Pastor Tim and I agreed to work side-by-side, dividing the workload of the pastoral staff (As opposed to OSL hiring yet another interim “lead” pastor). With that decision, my workload expanded to “full time” in July. Thanks to the steady encouragement of the Congregational Council and our talented support and ministry staffs and remarkable volunteers around every corner, the church continued to grow during this continued and evolving “interim.”

In this new configuration, I added to my Lifelong Learning oversight additional work with the still forming Discipleship/Evangelism ministry team and the Stewardship Committee (please read their full reports).

Lifelong Learning

I am thankful that, in June of this year, Madeline Trosvig accepted the congregation’s offer to move up from “coordinator” to “director” of faith formation in her work with the youngest third of our congregation. As her supervisor, I can again say that she has done a great job not only with her foundational work with our Sunday School-aged children (both through the year on Sundays but also with Vacation Bible School) but also her increasingly supportive work with our Confirmation and Senior High programs.

- I look back on seven adult learning, Sunday forums that were well attended. Three of these forums were led by Augustana University faculty—I was mindful of our need to continue to grow our relationship with AU and believe that these offerings helped in that regard.
- I am very thankful that both our shared reading of Bonhoeffer’s Life Together and Pope Francis’ The Church of Mercy, was a solid offering that involved scores of adults in deep conversations. Many hoped that “book reads” as I called them could continue in 2026. The OSL’s community library support of these parish studies was appreciated!
- Kristie Shreck’s and the library committee’s promotion of our outward facing, truly “community” library is to be celebrated. More and more people are walking through OSL’s doors because of their hospitality. The first Beyond the Books event (held in April of 2025) was a huge success with over 400 people attending over the weekend. The second Beyond the Books is scheduled for April 24-25.

Discipleship/Evangelism

This ministry team will increasingly oversee the work of our people, either outside our building doing the work of Christ in this world or, inviting people from far and wide into the church to grow in our ability to stay engaged in the issues of the day.

- Highlights from this past year for Discipleship/Evangelism include our congregation's servant trip to help reopen Klein Ranch bible camp. We went, we worked, we made a significant contribution in getting that camp reopened for the summer. But even more broadly, because of that impactful trip, we are being asked by Lutherans Outdoors leadership to be a voice at the table as new ways to use our bible camps are being discussed early in 2026.
- We are getting deeper into our conversations about care of creation when we "up" our recycling efforts and involve our children in those conversations. We hope to build upon our first efforts on this project next year.
- We had a great day joining with the Friends of the Big Sioux River in cleaning up a stretch of the Big Sioux this past fall and having the largest clean-up group of the year.
- I have enjoyed being a part of the spirited "Faith and Ferment" group which is bringing in author/pastor Angela Denker on October 3rd and 4th for a conference that will attract many people from the broader community, involving them in important discussions about how faith functions best against the super-charged, politically divided backdrop within which we live.

It was meaningful to be invited to join in prayed over conversations with the Stewardship committee. In the spirit of being mindful of our efforts to give the voice and the work of the congregation back to the people in the implementation of a new member-driven structure, the decision to invite the congregation to "step up together" in support of the General Fund with Statements of Intent seemed guided.

Last year, I wrote in my 2024 Annual Report, "I have been asked by the SD Synod office to continue my work here at OSL--as long as I am in your good graces and until a new lead pastor has been in place long enough for a proper transition to your new, full-time staff happens." With Pastor Michael's arrival and graceful start within the congregation as that new, lead pastor, my assignment as Associate, Interim pastor will conclude on Sunday, February 1. The proper handoffs of supervision and pastoral duties is easily happening.

Now, with Pastors Tim and Michael becoming the new face of the full-time pastoral team, OSL will enter its next time of discernment: who will you find to come and add their presence to the future ministry team that will prosper this congregation's work in Jesus' name for the decade to come? This is a rich time.

Words cannot express how much of a blessing it has been to walk with the good members of Our Saviors in this time of transition and rebirth. Your faithfulness inspired me! Your care for me and members of my family was a gift. I will forever be thankful that my nineteen months of interim ministry here at OSL will be yet another good memory of grace abounding.

STEWARDSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Size: The Stewardship Development Committee (SDC) shall be composed of five (5) to eleven (11) members, including one Governing Board member not assigned to any other committee and the senior pastor. Chair: The chair of the Stewardship Development Committee shall be chosen by the members of the committee at the first meeting of the committee following the annual meeting of the congregation.

Committee Responsibilities

- Develop a culture of stewardship and relationship development that creates an ongoing spirit of giving and generosity.
 - Coordinate and conduct the annual stewardship appeal.
 - Provide ongoing stewardship education to the congregation.
 - Centralize all church appeals, financial and in-kind, for awareness and coordination.
 - Authority: The SDC serves as an advisory committee to the Congregation Council.
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Committee Accomplishments

- Completed the Fall 2025 current fund campaign *Where Two or Three Gather - The Real Presence of Christ Among Us*. Your trust and participation in this "anonymous" approach yielded a return of 264 family intents and indicates at least a \$100,000 increase in giving over the previous year's 1.45 million.
- Continued the Time and Talent survey to collect member information needed to grow our ministries and missions to better serve each other and the world.
 - 243 total individual returns with 1068 interest areas.
 - OSL's Implementation Team is leading the way in helping ministry teams use this information and contact those who returned interests in their areas.
- Met monthly or more throughout the year.

Committee Priorities

- Continue growing Our Savior's culture of generosity.
 - Complete an annual Capital Fund campaign to gauge the congregation's ability and intent to grow and sustain our ministries.
 - Manage the gifts of Time and Talent survey to be used by our Implementation Team and our Ministry Teams to improve our service opportunities and better serve each other and the world.
 - Continue to tell our stories of generosity and how "Your Gifts Are Making a Difference".
 - Encourage congregation members to serve on all our committees and teams.
- Entertain new projects including:
 - Grow financial support from TV, online, and other media audiences.
 - Assist in creating NEW video messages during communion for our online audience thanking them and recognizing them as part of the worship and inviting them to become sustaining partners.
 - Encouraging Thrivent members to direct their 2025 Thrivent Choice dollars by March 31, 2026.

This committee functioned well throughout the year. Our efforts continue to nurture and grow an abundance mindset in the congregation. We continue to align our work with OSL's vision for ministry.

- Update communication for staff (operations) with the purchase of 6 two-way radios) \$299.00. An additional 6 will be purchased in 2026 for ushers and library
- Hired a 30 hour per week custodian which brings us to 1 ¾ FTE custodians
- Roof
 - 9 leaks repaired
- Purchased a cordless backpack vacuum to make vacuuming easier for custodians
- Batteries purchased for Riding vacuum cleaner (\$1,229.63) and floor scrubber
- Augie Day Care
 - Touch up painting done
 - Replace stained ceiling tiles
 - Replace faucet in boy's restroom
 - Unclogged water fountain drain
- Replaced mini split AC in room 103 with a donated window air conditioner. Bid for new mini split is \$10,000
- Boiler Repair – replace fan motor and blower wheel - \$1,546.63
- Kitchen garbage disposal replacement - \$2,855.51
- Water Heater replaced - \$14,867.37
- Kitchen Ice Maker Filter Unit Replaced
- Ongoing:

- Crack in Bell tower:
 - Crack monitors will be put into place to monitor the movement of crack. (monitor for at least 6 months)
 - Plan will be put in place to stabilize and repair
- Maintenance and Repair Fund – Through a generous donation we are working on a fund to help with continued maintenance cost for the church
- Roof
 - It was discovered that during tuck pointing the scaffolding punctured some holes in the roof membrane. 4 have been repaired. We will look at the entire area in the spring (ARS Roofing). Tuck Pointing company will cover the cost.
- Planned:
 - Friendship room – New heating and cooling system will be needed
 - Augie Day Care – Mini splits will start to need to be replaced starting in 2026
 - Interior Painting projects – (Volunteers)
 - Refinish tile floors – staff
 - Landscaping – Planting native grass in the west parking lot areas. This will reduce watering and mowing.
 - Sunday School Rooms – Equipping two larger rooms with technology to be used for meeting space. With the growth of facility use we need a couple more spaces for meetings. They will still be used for Sunday School.
 - Exterior painting
 - Security system upgrade – Adding cameras to exterior of building (Spring 2026)
 - Commercial dehumidifier for the library – Approx. \$3,000
 - Cleaning white wall with mural – Estimated cost \$11,500

HUMAN RESOURCES AND POLICY (HRP) COMMITTEE REPORT

Members: Carrie Aaron, Sonja Anderson, Beth Boyens, Sandy Henry, Anne Rieck-McFarland, Jane Hannestad, Dan Drenkow (ex-officio), and Rudy Kreyer (staff liaison).

- Following the work of the OSL Transition Team, including the assessment of human resources practices conducted by a third party (Alternative HR, Inc), the role of this committee was refined to be focused more precisely on human resources processes and procedures.
 - The committee's name was changed from the Policy and Leadership Development (PLD) Committee to the Human Resources and Policy (HRP) Committee. The HRP serves as an advisory committee to the Congregation Council.
 - A charter for the Human Resources and Policy Committee was developed, identifying that the purpose of HRP is to oversee and provide guidance and resources for OSL leadership primarily in the areas of human resources and policy development.
- Supported leadership and staff to establish and implement best practices regarding human resources management which included the creation of standardized forms and process documents including Employee Evaluation Form, Employee Status Change Form, Onboarding Checklists, and Exiting Checklist.
- Completed a major re-write of the Employee Policy Manual to make the document more welcoming, less wordy, and less prescribed. Training on the updated document, along with an outside speaker on the topic of leadership, was held with OSL team members with supervisory responsibilities in August.
- Established salary schedule which will be updated annually in conjunction with the OSL budget year.
- Continued to support and utilize OSL's HRIS (Human Resources Information System), Bamboo HR, to manage timekeeping, accruals, and other human resources functions.
- Provided guidance and support on staffing and personnel issues including job descriptions, hiring, restructuring, and separations.
- Reviewed the current employee benefit package.
- Identified importance of ongoing staff development and teambuilding; the Congregation Council held team-building retreats in January and August.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Committee Responsibilities*

- Review and monitor monthly financials reports.
- Recommend selection of third party to conduct annual financial reviews.
- Report on the results of all annual financial reviews to members of this congregation.
- Prepare an annual ministry plan that includes all projected expenditures, including capital expenditures.
- Review and monitor debt management strategies and make recommendations for change as needed.
- Review and recommend third party carrier for risk management portfolio.
- Recommend policies related to purchasing and sound financial practices

**All recommendations or decisions made by the Finance Committee must be approved and ratified by the Congregation Council.*

YTD Financial Report

- We hired a new Finance Coordinator in January of 2025. We have been going through a transition of getting better organized, setting up spread sheets, quick books, etc.
- Through December 2025
 - Total contributions available to fund operations are about \$25,800 ahead of budget. Our total budget for the year is 1.6 million. Contributions are at 51.62% of budget through December. Looking back one year ago our contributions are down approximately \$27,000.
 - Other income categories are generally consistent with prior year and with budget expectations.
 - We received \$152,000 from the foundation in 2025. These funds paid for such things as the new sound system in the Celebrate Center (\$30,000), Tuckpointing and caulking (\$72,000) updating the nursery, and many smaller projects. You can't imagine the amount of stress this takes off the general budget. We can be so grateful and blessed that we have the foundation. Thank you, members of the foundation.

- In addition to the Synod benevolence of \$125,000 benevolence through the church and foundation has been tremendous over the last six months due to congregation members, hockey parking, and the many gifts received.
- Personnel expenses are coming in the 47.5% of budget through December.
- Our building and maintenance continue to be a major expense of the overall budget but currently we are at 44% of our budget, which is great...
- We created department budgets, so each department has a better tracking of their expenses monthly.
- Total cash position as of January 12th, 2026, is \$818,333. The majority of this came from the sale of rental properties.
- Our annual review for 2025 will be completed by March 2026.

Committee Accomplishments

- Reviewed and approved monthly financial statements.
- Part of our cash includes \$51,178 earning 3.95% in a 12-month CD and \$29,377 in a savings account designated towards SOSA (Study or Serve Award) A unique opportunity for individuals of all ages connected to OSL to grow their faith, serve others, or explore ministry-related experiences.
- We also have a separate account of approximately \$416,250 earning 3.10% in a money market which are the funds from the sale of the rental properties. This would be our reserve account.
- We also have 3 accounts with the library, one with approximately \$30,000 which is their operating account, one with \$937 which is their Pay/Pal account, and a 12-month CD of \$41,649 earning 3.95%. Most of these funds are grant funds from the Bob and Rita Elmen Foundation.
- We have also recently set up a Long-Term Property Maintenance account with a starting balance of \$12,600 and hope to build this account for the many needs of our property.
- Hockey parking has been a great success so far. Funds raised have supported Food to You, Susan B Anthony school, OSL's Vacation Bible School, Sunday School and High School, Property Ministry, Community Outreach, Faith and Fermentation to bring in a guest speaker. Future weekends will be for Lutheran Outdoors and again for Property Ministry. Thank you to everyone that has volunteered to assist with this important fundraising opportunity.

Committee Priorities

- Maintain Benevolence with the Synod at \$125,000 for 2026. We have set up monthly payments with Synod. Synod contribution proposed to remain unchanged.
- Monitor monthly financial statements and position to ensure fiscally responsible leadership.
- Improved budget communication updates to church membership through the Intercom.
- Monitor cash levels.
- Track performance to FY26 Ministry Balanced Budget plan.
- Review our restricted accounts and make recommendations to consolidate, clean up and close out some of these accounts to the congregation council.
- If we receive congregation approval, we will begin working on changing OSL's fiscal year from a year ending in June to a calendar year beginning January 1, 2027. Our current fiscal year would end 6/30/ 2026 and then according to our accounting firm we would just have a six-month budget and six-month annual review ending 12/31/2026.

Governance Structure

The governance structure provides sufficient financial oversight and review, over OSL's operations. With the presentation that you are giving, changes need to be made with the congregation's support. The fiscal year ahead will challenge our faith community and community at large, and our finances will be no exception. We will always have room for improvement in direct and regular communication with the congregation from our Committee. I look forward to my and our committee's continued service to the congregation.

As the Ministry Teams continue to meet, the ministries identified by the TTF will be updated to reflect the active groups within OSL; if additional groups needed or identified, they were added.

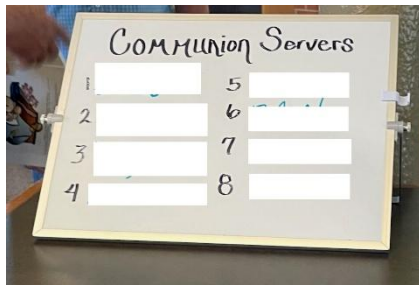

OSLC OPERATIONS REPORT

The past year has been a year filled with challenges, opportunities, and ultimately new beginnings. We had to take a long, comprehensive look at our budget in order to balance it for the 2026 Fiscal Year. To become balanced, we needed to reduce our overall budget from \$2,205,659 to \$1,839,693. This included decreasing departmental budgets across all ministry teams, as well as reducing staff and combining positions to ensure we are solvent for the current year and beyond. Extremely tough staffing decisions were made, recurring expenses and processes were reviewed for necessity, operational duties were shifted and absorbed, and in the end, we did our best to ensure no key programming was lost.

Budget cuts are never easy, especially in a time when costs are rising seemingly across the board. But despite the challenges, we are in line with our reduced budget this Fiscal Year. From July through December 2025, our overall expenses are \$866,639.20. Compared to July through December 2024, our expenses were \$994,147.83. A reduction of \$127,508.63 in expenses year over year. This was only made possible through the efforts of the congregation and staff alike. Many members have helped share more responsibilities and continue to offer their time and talents to lead initiatives, both ministry and operationally related. OSL staff continue to step up and take on extra work and duties to ensure we are moving forward. A huge thank you to the OSL staff and congregation for being great stewards of our beautiful church. With challenges come opportunity, and we all rose to the occasion, ultimately putting OSLC in a great position as we welcomed our new Lead Pastor!

We have welcomed our new Lead Pastor, a new Office Professional, a new Faith Community Nurse, and a new PT Custodian (30 hours/week). Augustana CLC signed a new 5-year lease, and we continue to see more Augustana events and meetings being held at OSL. We recently had a Building Survey performed to give us a better plan for current and future building maintenance needs. Upgrades have been made to our TV Ministry equipment to provide better service and capabilities for our viewers at home. This year we will celebrate OSL's 80th Anniversary and look to update our Directory. These are just a few updates aside from the many you will see in the Annual Report. May we all continue this beautiful journey together and always share God's love within and outside the walls of Our Saviors Lutheran Church.
